VOTING IN MARTIN'S ADDITIONS



Residents will elect **two candidates** in the May 12th, 2011 election to serve for two years on the Village Council beginning July 1, 2011. The polls will be located at the Brookville Road Village Center in front of the Village Office at 7013 Brookville Road. All eligible residents are encouraged to vote by casting their ballots in the polling area. Write-in candidates are permitted. All voting is by secret ballot and strict controls are put in place by elections officials to ensure all voters have the opportunity to cast ballots in privacy. Voting will be conducted outside if weather permits and will take place in the Olympia Coffee Shop - "Ann's Place" --if the weather is inclement. A street festival, "Celebration on the Sidewalk," will take place during the voting. The stores will remain open during the voting and refreshments will be served. 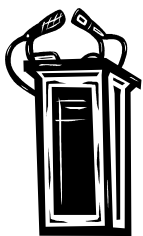
WHO CAN VOTE?

Any person who is 18 years of age or older as of Election Day, May 12th and resides in or owns property in Martin's Additions is entitled to vote in the Village Council election. Voters in Martin's Additions need not be registered to vote in Montgomery County or in the State of Maryland. Non-U.S. citizens are allowed to vote. The Election Committee will have an updated version of the Village Directory available and computerized to verify residents' names and addresses. If you're not listed on the voter rolls please be prepared to show a driver's license, a utility bill or other acceptable documentation showing **your Martin's Additions address** when you come to the polls. HERE ARE THE CANDIDATES...

RHONDA MIGDAIL

My name is Rhonda Migdail and I would like to introduce myself. I live at 7219 Delfield Street and I have been a resident of Martin's Additions for the past eleven years. I would like to represent you as a member of the Village of Martin's Additions Council.

There are a few questions you might want to ask,

Who are you?

I am a wife and mother of three children who all grew up in our community. They spent their childhoods walking to the Olympia Café with their friends, playing in Candy Cane Park and sledding down the hill on Shepherd Street. They attended the many events sponsored by our community like the Halloween Parade where they dressed up like princesses, or Superman, or one of the Beatles.

I am also a tax attorney who has been practicing law for more than twenty-five years. I specialize in

employee benefits work—the law governing retirement plans. I have worked as a technical advisor and manager in the federal government, I was a principal and the director of a national employee benefits research group for a major actuarial consulting firm, an ERISA attorney, a Staff Vice President of a major corporation, an HR consultant and Senior Counsel, Pensions to a major trade association which experiences have provided me with the skills and confidence to handle many difficult and challenging issues. Before that, I attended the University of Pennsylvania Law School and I received a B.S. in Economics from the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce where I majored in Accounting. While in law school, I was a teaching assistant in accounting at the Wharton School.

Most importantly for this position, I am a concerned citizen. Over the past few years, I have spent many nights in a dark and cold house in the winter (or at other times during the year even when there was no storm brewing) when Pepco failed to provide us with the basic electricity they have promised and contracted to provide to us; and I showed up to the Council meeting when Pepco was invited and expressed my concerns and demanded answers. I watched our elderly neighbors struggling during those periods and even witnessed one of my neighbors being rescued by the local police when the power outage went on for several days.

So, you may ask, why do I want to hold the position of a Council member?

Because like the other members of the Village of Martin's Additions Council, I care. I care about our community, our children, our elderly. I would like to be part of identifying our community needs and determining priorities. This is our community—we need to represent the interests of all citizens in the Village; for example, we need to ensure that the building and zoning regulations are administered in a way that protects and preserves the rights of our neighbors.

Because I think I can make a difference. During my adult life, I have volunteered at my children's school to lead efforts on auctions to raise money for scholarship funds, to co-chair book fairs, and in many other capacities. In the community, I have volunteered to feed the homeless. In my work life, I have always promoted change, looked for ways to do things better, more effectively.

Because I believe I have the skills that are needed to be an effective Council member. My business and legal skills would serve me well in such a position. I have held many management positions during my career, and so I understand the need and have the ability to ensure the continuation of vital day-to-day services such as trash collection, street and sidewalk maintenance, care of trees, and such. But I do believe that there are areas where we can and should be doing a better job; ensuring that our community is provided the respect that we deserve from those who serve our community.

Because, in the past, I have not been afraid to express my opinions and concerns on such issues. As a Council member, I would take the time to listen, really listen, to the concerns of our community, and ensure that residents' concerns are heard and addressed to the extent possible, whatever the issue.

Because I am an innovator, and sometimes, to ensure we are heard might require an innovative and creative approach. For example, there may be issues that affect an area larger than just Martin's Additions; maybe one that impacts all of Chevy Chase. In such a situation, as a Council member, I would reach out to the other impacted communities to see if we might be able to form a coalition on certain issues, using the concept of strength in numbers to provide us a louder voice in the discussion and resolution of such common issues.

And so, in closing, I ask that you consider voting for me to be a member of the Village of Martin's Additions Council.



CHRISTOPH MUELLER

For the past eight years, my wife Lexy and I have lived on Shepherd Street, where our children progressed from Middle School through College. We've lived in Montgomery County for 23 years.

I am currently the Vice Chairman of the Village of Martins Additions Council. I have accepted a nomination to stand for another term and am happy to serve another term.

My participation in Village affairs over the past two years has been a remarkable experience in decision making, collaboration and execution. It's not what I expected. It took me about a year to understand the full scope and complexity of what we undertake as a separate municipality. I thought we would spend our time debating development, leash laws, the tree canopy and building codes. We talked about all of those things and they represent the interesting part of life as a Council member; however, most of our time is spent monitoring and guiding our day to day affairs and finances. We worry through the budget. We comb through the revenue projections and discuss downgrading third party service levels to save money. We talk about the challenge of on-going construction projects and infrastructure maintenance. What maintenance do we defer? What about our crumbling sidewalks? Which community events stay; which go? In addition, we must remain abreast of our regulatory and reporting obligations. As I have a long personal history in legislative and business affairs, I naturally fell into the role. I've come to enjoy my participation.

Why remain involved?

I was nominated for Council for the first time, just over two years ago. I ran for office uncertain of how effectively I could contribute or if this was truly of interest to me. I quickly grew involved and enthusiastic. This was important stuff we were dealing with. Other Council members were smart, engaged and collaborative (for the most part). This wasn't like my old radical days when we debated the death of socialism and future of American democracy. I'm involved because I can contribute in a real way and we're getting something done.

Where I am' in my participation: I'm not interested in a long tenure. Part of what makes the Council dynamic is the on-going introduction of new participants. For my personal experience on the Council, this still feels like a new, productive learning experience. We are motivated towards results. Now that I've 'hit my stride,' I want to 'see the project through.' A lot of what we undertook in the past year remains very active: We're nearing the end of our storm water management initiative. After a huge financial jolt, we have launched a successful budget trajectory; we've really begun to see the positive impact of our land use guidelines, and we're back on track for some significant infrastructure improvements. Perhaps another term in office will also be productive.

Routine recurring services: For on-going management of our day to day services, I (and the Council) can take only limited credit. We've succeeded in retaining one of the best Village Managers from among many municipal chief operating officers. I want to perpetuate our 'execution model.' Our interaction with the Village staff on operational matters is highly collaborative yet, we don't micro-manage. We should continue to monitor day to day affairs, priorities and quality and cost of services. We should always examine successes and opportunities for improvement.

Directional Focus: Our most important contribution should remain ensuring continued public services, fiscal responsibility and maintaining the quality of Village life. This includes resuming our capital improvement projects and the legacy of Harry M. Martin. I am very fond of the historic Martin's Additions. I don't expect everyone to share my admiration for 1920's, 30's and 40's architecture; however, I don't want VMA turning into a Friendship Heights or an over-built enclave of exclusive mansions.

The Big Utilities: Despite my radical youth, I do not intend lead a blazing charge against Pepco. We are a small town with no meaningful recourse against these giants. Instead, we have experienced

remarkable progress through persuasion and productive negotiation with this large utility. I recognize that anything is possible but we have limited resources.

We monitor Pepco's opportunities and actions in our community. Our jawboning has brought success in the form of clearing around overhead lines (a controversial issue), a pole replacement program and a scheduled upgrade on the infamous Norbeck line. While I encourage dissatisfied customers to pursue all legal remedies, we are not ideally positioned to demand much beyond what we have already successfully bargained for.

A little more about me:

I am a graduate of the Foreign Service School at Georgetown University. This was followed by a journey into late 70's and early 80's politics. I later pursued some graduate level design studies in Architecture and established a successful building business. Running my own business gave way to a variety of roles in business affairs. I am currently on the leadership team at OPNET Technologies, a Bethesda based software company.

I am also a member of the National Capital Velo Club and after my bike ride, I help my wonderful spouse of 25 years in our garden. Peter and Claire are both off to college but visit regularly.

MICHAEL ZIELINSKI

My wife, Judy, and I have lived on Turner Lane since 1974, except for a brief displacement to California in 1998-99. Our daughters, Kristin and Allison, arrived a few years after we moved in, spent their childhoods on our quiet block, and have moved on to pursue their own careers. We recently completed a modest, one-floor-living, addition because we want to stay here for the long (hopefully) haul.

I became involved in Village business in the 1980s, when it was a special taxing district, and served on the Council shortly after the Village became incorporated as a full-fledged municipality. I was Council Chair from 1987 to 1989, and headed up the effort to write the Village's first Code of Ordinances. More recently, I chaired the Zoning Tax Force, which recommended changes to the Village Building Code designed to reduce the impact of mansionization. Those changes were largely adopted by the Council and became law in 2009. I'm currently completing a two-year term as Council member, and am chair of the Storm Water Task Force, which has recommended steps that could be taken to reduce the impact of storm water runoff on adjacent properties.

There is never a shortage of issues important to Village residents. Efforts to force PEPCO to put service delivery ahead of stockholder returns, and concerns about traffic on "cut-through" streets, which we dealt with in the 80s, are two of the current "hot" issues. Of broader impact have been drastic reductions in traditional funding sources that have greatly strained the Village's budget, forced the postponement of important capital projects and the trimming of some Village services.

Before becoming an Administrative Law Judge, a position from which I am semi-retired, I spent 25 years as a civil litigator defending the District of Columbia. That experience instilled in me a strong sense of protecting the public fisc. In past years, I opposed donating Village funds to put more computers in Chevy Chase Elementary School and new play equipment in Shepherd Street park. While those were worthwhile endeavors, I believed that contributing Village funds to County projects would set dangerous precedent, and that if Village reserve funds were to be reduced (wish we had more now), they should be distributed to Village residents, who would be free to support whatever causes they desired.

I have enjoyed my return to the Council, and would like to serve another term. Thank you for your consideration.



FY 2012 BUDGET FOR THE VILLAGE OF MARTIN'S ADDITIONS

OVERVIEW

In developing the current year's budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2011 ending June 30, 2011 the Village Council was mindful of the unexpected decline in revenues that occurred in the previous year (FY 2010) which required drawing down reserve funds significantly to cover necessary operating expenses in that fiscal year. An extraordinary downturn in income tax receipts in FY2010 precipitated a dramatic reduction in services and expectations for FY 2011. The current year's budget deliberately held down spending while planning for even lower revenues. Capital improvements have been deferred until late in the fiscal year when we have better information on both spending and income. Fortunately, due to a tight rein on spending and some small increases on the revenue side, the Village now contemplates a surplus of \$82,000 which will be put into the reserve fund for use as a buffer against unanticipated expenses as well as revenue for future capital improvements.

For FY2012, we are again being very conservative in our income projections and in our expenses. This means that we will continue to take a cautious approach to important infrastructure repairs and replacement for another year until we can feel more confident about our income levels. We will continue to maintain reserves at a level consistent with good budget policies recommended by our accountant and auditors and for unanticipated expenses and emergency capital improvements.

FY2011: THE CURRENT SITUATION

At this time, it appears that Village revenues will be approximately \$40,000 higher than originally projected; the Village share of the state income tax, which is two-thirds of the total village income, is the single largest source of the increase. The higher-than-expected revenues came from late payments of residents' income taxes from previous years. We receive our share of state income taxes as they flow into the state's coffers, including back taxes and late payments making accurate forecasting nearly impossible. State tax analysts believe there will not be a repetition of this idiosyncratic event for FY 2012. Projected lower income necessitated reduced expenditures in FY2011. We accomplished this by reducing certain services: community-wide events fell from four to two; we restructured the agenda of Council meetings to allow for reduction of legal representation and shortened time requirements for the building administrator's report; street cleaning and general maintenance were reduced or deferred; we decreased the number of leaf bags distributed in the fall, reduced the number of new tree plantings, reduced bulk trash pick-ups to every other month, eliminated yard waste collection during the winter months, eliminated sidewalk shoveling for eligible residents and forestalled capital improvement projects such as street lighting upgrades and pavement repairs.

In addition, the Village Manager sought other savings by identifying lower cost alternatives to current services without diminishing service levels. Examples include a lower cost copier, cheaper storage facilities, and reduced insurance premiums. Nature helped by producing fewer severe snowstorms than last year, although tree damage from storms added significantly to tree care expenses.

The negative side of the FY2011 thrift is an accumulation of needs such as tree replacements and street repairs. Wind and snow storm damage required clean up and removal of trees and debris that added \$10,000 of expense for the clean-up alone. The Council amended the current year budget by adding \$2,000 to begin the tree planting catch-up program. Although the ideal planting time is in the fall, the Council is concerned that the tree-replacement budget will be overwhelmed by tree losses both from storm damage and PEPCO's reliability improvement program that contemplates removing more than a dozen trees in the Village.

The Council intends to put any budget surplus into a designated account for the badly needed street light replacement.

FY 2012: LOOKING AHEAD

For FY 2012, we are conservatively projecting total income about \$26,000 below FY2011. Receipts from personal income will likely not include the unanticipated revenues received in FY2011. Additionally, assessed property values in the Village have fallen 20%. In order to maintain property tax revenues at last year's level, the Council is recommending that the constant yield tax rate of \$.0460 per \$100 of assessed real property, calculated by the State of Maryland Department of Assessments and Taxation, be adopted. Property owners should not find their Village portion of the property tax changed. The Council has also proposed that the three other taxes applied in VMA remain unchanged from the current year: the personal property rate is set at this year's level of \$0.50 per \$100 of assessed value, the commercial property tax rate is set at \$0.10 and utility tax rate is set at \$1.45 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Strict attention to costs in the past year has permitted us to increase some expenditures with only a very modest rise in the total allocation. The budget for operating expenses includes money to replace deteriorating furnishings and upgrade village equipment, especially one of the computers. An updated Village directory will be published. Other major changes include additional tree plantings, and support for local community affairs such as block parties. Total operating expenditures are projected to be \$7,800 higher than the current year. Taking income and expenditures together, we are forecasting a net surplus in FY2012 of \$48,000.

Long lasting capital improvements are necessary to maintain and improve the community's infrastructure. These can be postponed in tight times, but extended delay will lead to visible deterioration in the fabric of the Village. We plan to resume capital improvements financed by withdrawals from our capital improvements reserve account; projects include sidewalk rebuilding on Taylor Street, Turner Lane, and Brookville Road. In addition, another \$100,000 will be placed in the street lighting reserve fund for future improvements. As always, capital improvement projects will be delayed until the latter half of the fiscal year when we have a better idea of our projected income and expense levels.

GATHER YOUR FAMILY AND COME ON DOWN TO
