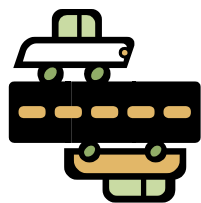
NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAIRMAN

Last month we reported that there are extensive plans in the works to significantly develop the Chevy Chase Lake area, just north of us on Connecticut Avenue at Jones Bridge Road. With the creation of a new zoning category that allows combined residential and commercial development—an all-new zoning concept here in Montgomery County—the construction of the Purple Line, and the amount of available space for development as the land space now allows, this area has the ability to look very different than it does currently. It also has the potential for making our lives here in Martin's Additions very different.

Our Village, along with neighboring municipalities, neighborhood associations, civic groups and interested resident groups, has created the CACC—the Connecticut Avenue Corridor Committee—to examine, monitor, share and communicate our concerns about the impact of this development on the neighboring communities as they now exist. Information about this plan and its progress and development can be found on our website under "*Hot Topics-Chevy Chase Lake Sector Plan*," which we will keep updated as information becomes available.

To date our concerns on the development at the Chevy Chase Lake location have focused on the possible impact of increased traffic on our lives. We have asked that any travel studies that are conducted in relation to this development include not only Connecticut Avenue, East-West Highway, and Jones

Bridge Road but also all of the side streets that could be affected by changes in traffic patterns. Our pleas for a more all-encompassing traffic study have not been accepted by the Montgomery County planners that are overseeing this process.

It is also posted on the bulletin board at the Market Area under Public Notice and a preliminary agenda is published in this newsletter.

I am concerned that we have even bigger, unaddressed issues that relate to our quality of life more than traffic. As was evident during this last snow storm—many residents were without power yet again—the electrical infrastructure is sadly out-of-date. It is time to start asking if our entire existing infrastructure can handle the increased demands of the Chevy Chase Lake expansion.

Recently, the Village has needed extensive work by WSSC, PEPCO and Washington Gas on our waterlines, sanitary sewers, power lines and gas lines. This work has caused untold disruptions to daily life for our residents on the affected streets. Surprising discoveries have been made on the condition of the infrastructure below the surface in addition to our problems with overhead electrical lines and overburdened utility poles that are at risk.

Shared, difficult to find sewer lines, the potential for catastrophic sewer overflow, torn up front lawns and much more, are easily the result of the inadequacies of the current system that are being uncovered. Almost daily water line breaks County-wide provide a constant surprise either in the home or on the road. How much more can we expect from our current infrastructure to support new development?

We need a larger pool of concerned citizens who will address the wider, and equally life-changing issues of our basic infrastructure needs and demands. Residents can get involved by attending meetings on the Chevy Chase Lake development, and writing letters to our state senators and representatives, the County Executive and the County Council, and the Montgomery County Planning Board. We will make those contacts available through this newsletter and on our website. See page 5 for the current meeting schedule. *Richard Krajeck*

2011 VILLAGE ELECTION PROCESS KICKED OFF

Beginning Monday, February 28, 2011 nominations for the Village Council are being accepted by the Village Elections Committee. This year two seats are open on the Council. Each seat is for a two-year term.

Would you like to serve as a Council Member? Martin's Additions is a self-governing, incorporated municipality in the State of Maryland. As such, the Village is responsible for providing trash collection, recycling, road and sidewalk repair, snow plowing, and other municipal services. To support these service, the Village sets rates for local property taxes and derives significant receipts from income taxes through the State. The smooth function of government and delivery of services has depended on the ability and willingness of interested residents to serve on the governing body—the Village Council. Would YOU like to be involved? Consider becoming a candidate.

Who can be nominated? Any resident of Martin's Additions who is a qualified voter (18 years old as of Election Day, May 12) may nominate another qualified resident or him - or herself.

How do you nominate a candidate? Nominations must be made in writing and sent to the Election and Ethics Committee, c/o Village of Martin's Additions, 7013B Brookville Road, Chevy Chase, MD 20815. Nominations open on Monday, February 28, and close on Friday April 8.

What do I have to do if I am a nominee? Ensure that your written nomination is received by the Elections Committee no later than April 8. A Candidate's Statement must be received no later than Thursday, April 14 along with a brief biographical sketch. Candidates will be welcomed at the April 21st Council meeting. The Candidates' Forum, scheduled for Saturday morning April 30 from 10:30 AM to noon, is another opportunity for candidates to meet residents and present their position statements.

VILLAGE WILL PROVIDE STORM DEBRIS CLEAN UP TUES., FEB. 22nd and WEDS. FEB 23rd



A chipper truck has been scheduled to come through the Village on **Tuesday, February 22nd and Wednesday February 23rd** to assist homeowners with the removal of storm debris from their property. This service is provided under the direction and supervision of the Village arborist, Paul Wolfe. Please observe the guidelines below.

- **All debris must be at the curb by Tuesday morning, February 22nd.** The truck will pass your house once. The crew will NOT come back and pick up additional piles of debris you place at the curb after the original pile has been removed.
- Place debris as close to the curb as you can, in piles facing the street. Take care not to block the sidewalk.
- Large ends of branches (the butt-end) should face the street.
- Chipper can handle branches and limbs up to **12" in diameter.** Length is generally not an issue.
- **The general rule:** if you hired a tree company to clear your property of debris, that tree company should remove the debris. This is being provided as a supplemental service to collect storm debris that residents can haul to the curb themselves. It is provided in lieu of requiring residents to cut up limbs and debris and place them in bags or tie them in bundles.
- No old log piles or construction debris please. Storm debris only.
- Normal, bagged yard debris pick up will not resume under Waste Management until Monday, March 14th. Any debris left after this special chipper truck collection must be placed on private property until normal debris collection resumes.

COUNCIL ACCEPTS FINAL REPORT FROM STORM WATER COMMITTEE



The formal report of the Village of Martin's Additions Storm Water Task Force was presented to the Village Council by Task Force Chair and Council Member Michael Zielinski at the January 2011 meeting of the

Council. The complete final report can be found on the website under the Hot Topics tab. The following is a summary of the report.

When the Village of Martin's Additions (VMA) first began to address the issues surrounding infill development and redevelopment in the spring of 2007, residents expressed concerns about the effects that increased impervious surface areas and increased size of structures had on storm water runoff. The Village decided to defer consideration of the storm water issues, and proceeded with a comprehensive review of its building ordinance, appointing a Land Use Task Force. VMA eventually enacted amendments to the building ordinance, which became effective in June of 2009.

The Storm Water Task Force (SWTF) was formed in February, 2010 and met monthly through December, 2010. The SWTF's mission was to: (1) evaluate options that may be available to the Village to address storm water issues associated with new construction and other lot improvements, specifically water runoff resulting from new construction that could adversely affect adjacent private or public property; and (2) evaluate the sustainability of the Village's current storm water management system (storm water drains) to handle current and increased flow.

Two developments with respect to storm water issues occurred following the initial concerns expressed by Village residents in 2007. By far the most significant was the County's enactment of an ordinance requiring that construction projects adding significant lot coverage provide safe conveyance of, or retain on the property, storm water runoff generated by the new construction. The second development was the Village's enactment of amendments to its building ordinance, which became effective in

June of 2009, imposing limitations on new construction, one of the purposes of which was to minimize the flow of storm water from lots by encouraging the maintenance of open spaces and the reduction of impervious surfaces.

Once underway, the Task Force, aided by professionals in the field, reviewed storm water provisions in the Montgomery County Code and in neighboring Chevy Chase jurisdictions which addressed storm water runoff, considered storm water issues prevalent in the Village, initiated a survey of Village residents to gather information on specific storm water issues, consulted Montgomery County officials regarding the storm water drainage system in the Village, and independently observed and reviewed various aspects of potential storm water drainage problems related to construction and the Village's drainage system.

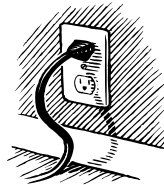
The SWTF initiated the survey in April of last year. VMA residents were asked to complete a questionnaire. Eighty-seven of 333 households returned a completed survey. At least one resident from each Village street responded. Sixty-six of the 87 respondents have experienced water problems. Of those 66, about 50% attributed the water problems to grading, 39% to storm water runoff, and 25% to construction on adjacent property. Of the 53 respondents who have paid to fix their water problems, 11% have paid more than \$25,000, 24% have paid more than \$10,000, and 41% paid more than \$5,000. Residents have used a wide variety of approaches to address water problems, including French drains, rain barrels, swales, and sump pumps.

After careful consideration of all the information it gathered, the task force concluded that:

- The Village's current storm drain system, which belongs to and is the responsibility of Montgomery County, at least for the present, is adequate to withstand a heavy rain event. The County believes that the system meets the design standard of having the capacity to handle a 10-year storm event. The Task Force has recommended that the Village request that the County investigate the back-up problems at the "private drain" at the end of dead-end Delfield, and design and implement a solution, with the assistance of private property owners, if necessary.



- Construction of large homes and new additions has increased impervious areas throughout the Village. When building ordinance amendments were considered, numerous residents complained of increased storm water runoff caused by construction. Some survey responses reported problems attributable, at least in part, to storm water runoff from construction on adjacent properties. However, all of the construction projects to which water runoff problems could be attributed were initiated prior to the applicability of the 2007 Montgomery County “Control of Water Runoff on Small Lots” ordinance. Construction projects in VMA that were subject to that ordinance and that complied with the drainage plans required do not appear to have generated any complaints of adverse water runoff on adjacent properties.
- While relatively few completed VMA construction projects have been subject to the County ordinance or the 2009 changes to the VMA building regulations, the Task Force believes that, at this point, there is insufficient data to justify the amendment of the Village ordinances to add complex or costly drainage plan requirements, like those in the Town of Chevy Chase. Consideration should be given to amending the Village ordinances to require applicants for building permits to demonstrate that storm water run off would not adversely affect adjoining property, and ensure that storm water control devices built or installed as part of a building project to satisfy Village and County laws are fabricated to be cleanable and are maintained in good working order.
- Voluntary efforts to reduce the amount of storm water runoff that flows directly into the Village sewer system should be strongly encouraged. The Village should assist in educating residents about storm water management practices and programs. The Village is in the Chesapeake Bay Watershed and all storm water runoff eventually leads to and impacts the health of the Bay.



PEPCO WILL INSTALL SPECIAL MONITORS

Pepco, at a homeowner’s request, will install a special power data logger on the electric meter, which then collects data from both lines coming into the home (low and high voltage). The logger records for three days and is then removed and the collected data analyzed. Any problems found will be communicated to the homeowner. The homeowner does not need to be home when the monitor is installed or removed. If you want a monitor attached to your house, call the Village office at 301-656-4112 and we will walk you through the necessary steps.

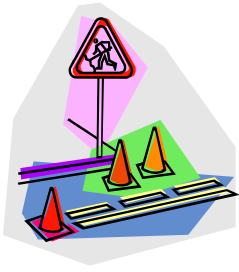

UTILITY WORK IN VILLAGE MIGHT BURY US!

The Village of Martin’s Additions has found itself under the strong arm of a number of utilities, performing a wide range of infrastructure repairs on multiple streets. Delfield Street has taken

the bulk of the disruption as a result of needed sanitary sewer line replacement and construction of lateral sewer connections to several homes. Two village trees had to be removed to accommodate new sewer lines and serious delays in the project have occurred as the engineers have tried to find a way around the complications uncovered when the ground was opened up. The whole project has proved to be very inconvenient for residents—to say the least—but residents and the contractors alike have been very patient.

The dead end of Raymond Street is having the same work done on its sanitary sewers. Not to be outdone by complications on Delfield Street, one of the Raymond Street sanitary manholes is enclosed behind a fence on private property, just outside of Martin’s Additions, adding property and boundary concerns to construction complications. It seems that

things always come in threes, which certainly is true in this case. The Village just received notice that a stretch of Thornapple Street sanitary sewers (houses number 3402-3406) are scheduled for pipe bursting perhaps early this summer. Water lines on

Oxford Street are to be repaired in the spring (if all goes well with the coordination with the District of Columbia) and will require extensive street excavation. If this isn’t enough, let’s add to the mix the power problems and associated repairs throughout the Village: tree trimming along our main arteries, PEPCO tree removal throughout the Village that then requires follow up with tree butt removal and stump grinding, storm damage clean-up from our very heavy January snow storm, a water main break on Bradley Labe, persistent water meter leaks on Summit, and Brookville Road intersection icing from fire hydrant leaks. It’s enough to make us all crazy. If you have not read the Chairman’s letter about infrastructure



concerns please do so. Our current experience certainly should be a concern for our future. The concept of “planned growth” which relies on the integrity of our infrastructure to allow for, and encourage, development is seriously challenged if a lot of the assumptions that underlie that policy are false. It is important that we examine those assumptions. Our recent experience seems to be saying something different.



COLD WEATHER, WARM HEARTS

In spite of January’s bitter cold, residents of Martin’s Additions stepped up big time to help the hungry among us. Our food drive on Jan. 17th, the Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service, netted 522 pounds of canned/boxed non-perishables; \$77 in cash was also donated and was used to buy more food. So all told, our monthly contribution weighed in at 746 pounds – a little less than last January but still a very generous amount! And we got some nice recognition in an article in the on-line newspaper: www.chevyCHASE.patch.com. A big thanks to everyone who donated and to our terrific youngsters who volunteered to pick up donations from others.



Now, we must work to keep our effort going. Until the economy makes a complete comeback, many of our Montgomery County neighbors will continue to be in need of food assistance. We are fortunate to live in a Village of plenty, so please remember to add a can or two of food for Manna on your next trip to buy groceries. The Manna Food Center provides a three-to-four day supply of food each month to individuals and families certified as being in need and also delivers to organizations serving low-income seniors, the homeless and people with mental illness. Sad Goodbye to...

Andrew J. Cummings Jr., of Cummings Lane

On Friday, January 21, 2011 Andrew J. Cummings, life-long resident of Chevy Chase, MD, husband of the late Ida Orme Cummings, passed away at home. Born on December 6, 1915, Mr. Cummings had just celebrated his 95th birthday. This fine man, friend, neighbor, father, grandfather, and great grandfather, with his family, helped to shape our part of Chevy Chase, long before there was a Martin's Additions. He was always generous in sharing his recollections with the local Historical Societies and with interested neighbors and amateur historians. A longer article that includes these recollections will be published here in March. Mr. Cummings was buried with military honors at St. John's Cemetery, Forest Glen where the names on the family obelisk include three generations of Cummings, including those of the original Cummings settlers.

Roy Gordon, Beloved Chevy Chase Village Police Chief.

We are sad to report that Chief Roy Gordon died on January 28 from complications of acute leukemia. Roy had been with the CCV Police for 15 years, 10 of which as Chief. He was known for being a gentleman, a level-headed administrator and a mentor to many. Roy served as a Sergeant in the Marine Corp, and was a veteran police officer for 38 years. He spent 23 years with the Montgomery County Police Department, and completed FBI Academy training at Quantico, VA. Roy was a graduate of the University of Maryland and earned a Masters Degree in Criminology at George Washington University. He periodically served as an adjunct professor at Montgomery County Community College teaching Criminal Justice. In his earlier years he studied at the Carmelite Seminary in upstate New York. He loved sports, was a huge Ravens fan and an avid tennis player and golfer. He was a very good friend of Martin's Additions, helping us out every time we asked, even when we were no longer under contract with the Village Police Department. Roy is survived by his wife Diane, daughters Cathryn and Patricia and 5 grandchildren. The Village of Martin's Additions contributed a beautiful spray of flowers to his funeral services at All Saints Episcopal Church in Chevy Chase Circle.

DO YOU SMELL WHAT I SMELL?



If you smell natural gas, call the Washington Emergency Leak Line at 703-750-1400 or 1-800-752-7520. Do not attempt to locate the source of the odor. If the odor is very strong or you hear a blowing or hissing noise, leave the building immediately, leaving doors unlocked as you go. Do not light a match, use the telephone, turn on electrical equipment or turn light switches on or off, or start your car. You want to avoid creating any ignition source. Once you are at a safe distance from the building, use your cell phone or a neighbor's phone to call 911 and the Emergency Leak Line.

ENERGY CORNER

Did you know that you can borrow a Kill-O-Watt Meter from Bethesda Green to measure how electricity-efficient your house is? The meter reads the power demand, energy use and other handy statistics of appliances and electronics. To borrow one email them at info@bethesdagreen.org or call the office at 240-396-2440. 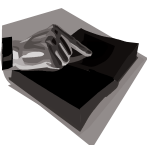
