## NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAIRMAN

At the January Council meeting, Officer Mathis of the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office spoke on the Neighborhood Watch program. **2009 VILLAGE ELECTION  
PROCESS BEGINS SOON**

Beginning Monday, March 2<sup>nd</sup> nominations for the Village Council will be accepted by the Village Elections Committee. This year two seats will be open on the Council. Each seat is for a two-year term.



Would you like to serve as a Council Member?

Martin's Additions is a self-governing, incorporated municipality in the State of Maryland. As such, the Village is responsible for providing trash collection, recycling, road and sidewalk repair, snow plowing, and other municipal services. The Village sets rates for local property taxes and derives significant income from the State to pay for these services. The smooth function of government and these services has depended on the ability and willingness to serve on the part of concerned residents. Would YOU like to be involved? Consider being a candidate.

Who can be nominated?

Any resident of Martin's Additions who is a qualified voter (18 years old as of Election Day, May 7<sup>th</sup>) may nominate another qualified resident or him- or herself.

How to nominate a candidate.

Nominations must be made in writing and sent to Frank Correl, Chairman of the Elections and Ethics Committee at the VMA Office, 7013B Brookville Road, Chevy Chase, MD 20815. Nominations open on Monday, March 2<sup>nd</sup>, and close on Wednesday, April 1<sup>st</sup>.

What do I have to do if I am a nominee?

Ensure that your written nomination is received by the Elections Committee no later than April 1. A Candidate's Statement must be submitted during the nominations period (must be received no later than Thursday, April 9) along with a brief resume. Statements and resumes of each candidate will be published before the Candidates' Forum, scheduled for April 16<sup>th</sup>, the date of the regular monthly Council meeting.

**HELP THE SNOW PLOWS  
DO A GOOD JOB!**

**Park your car in your driveway**

It makes it so much easier, more effective and safer to plow the streets if cars are in the driveway! We can do a much better job clearing your street of snow without maneuvering around parked vehicles. This practice also provides more parking spaces for residents without driveways. Unfortunately, there's little our plow operators can do to keep snow away from your driveway entrance or parked cars.



**PLEASE keep intersections clear of parked cars if you must park on the street!**

The snow plows are BIG and are slowed down (sometimes prevented completely) by cars parked up close to intersections, especially at Summit Avenue and Thornapple Street.



## DON'T FORGET TO SHOVEL YOUR SIDEWALKS!

Village residents are responsible for clearing sidewalks in front of their property of snow and ice within twelve hours after the snow storm ceases. Residents who occupy corner lots are responsible for sidewalks in front and on the side of their property. If you need help shoveling, **Verges Construction**, a small services firm located in Kensington who often works for Martin's Additions, can provide you with **shoveling services** for a fee. 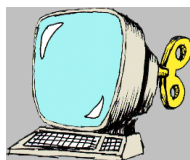
## HOLIDAY FUND A GREAT SUCCESS

## VMA WEBSITE UP AND RUNNING

We are happy to announce that the Village website, [www.martinsadditions.org](http://www.martinsadditions.org) is now formally up and running! As our opening Home Page states, the site is still "under construction", meaning that we'd like to hear if you have some suggestions on how to improve or add to what's there.



Beginning this month, residents will be able to register their email address through the Village website in order to receive special notices, emergency information and the like from the Village Office (see the following article). As of March 2009 the minutes of the Village Council meeting will no longer be routinely included in the newsletter because they are now available on the website. The minutes will continue to be posted on the bulletin board and are available for review in the Village office.

## NEW COMMUNICATION FEATURE ON OUR WEBSITE

Our newly launched Martins Additions' website ([martinsadditions.org](http://martinsadditions.org)) provides the opportunity for residents of Martin's Additions to **register for email communications** from the Village Office on village business and services that would be of immediate concern to residents. This feature will allow the Village to send timely email notices to registered residents. The Village Office has been using the List Serv for such notice, but would also like to be able to send you an official Village notice. ***This is a one-way communication tool from us to you, so you needn't be worried about additional mass e-mail traffic or spam.***



## HOW TO REGISTER TO RECEIVE EMAILS

Open our webpage (go to [www.martinsadditions.org](http://www.martinsadditions.org)) and look at the very top of the page in the upper right hand corner you'll see the word "Register". Click on that word and you'll be taken to the User Registration Page. Fill in the requested information (it's easy). Just before you click on the final "Register" button you will be asked to re-type some funny looking characters presented to you in a grid box. While this may seem to be a cumbersome task, this action will help us control spam in our Village inbox. You'll get a message back that says "User Registration-Success! We will begin forwarding notices to you through this facility once we have a modestly sized data base of registrants. Encourage your neighbors to participate.



## TENT CATERPILLARS IN-WAITING

Did you see tent caterpillars in your trees last year? If so, the time is soon ripe to pre-treat those trees to prevent a re-emergence this coming summer. You remember those disgusting masses of teeming caterpillars threatening to eat up your trees? They are most effectively managed with the use of a biological control agent applied in mid-April. Paul Wolfe of Integrated Plant Care who cares for the Village trees and will be treating Village trees in April is happy to discuss your need for this treatment. He can be reached at 301-881-8130.



## HEMLOCKS ON THE DECLINE.

A recent rise in hemlock woolly adelgid (aphids) populations—insects that attach themselves to the tree’s needles and extract valuable nutrients—are threatening the entire hemlock tree population. These pests look like little white balls of cotton on the twigs. This pest has caused so much damage that in some places there are very few hemlocks left; Connecticut’s native hemlocks for example, have virtually disappeared.

The control of this pest and thus the survival of the hemlock tree is really just a matter of an annual application of horticultural oil. Call Paul Wolfe at 301-881-8130 for a free consultation on how to identify and correct this problem on your hemlocks.

## DO YOU KNOW ABOUT THE LEACH LAWS IN MoCo?

Montgomery County leach laws, in effect since 2005, **require residents to leash dogs in public**, unless the area is designated as a dog exercise area or the dog is participating in a supervised dog activity such as a dog show. Fines for dogs off leash begin at \$100 for the first offense and go up to \$500. **This means your dog cannot run loose even if you are walking with him or watching him.** Please neighbors, for the sake of everyone, leash your dogs when they’re outside—it’s not only the law, it’s the civilized thing to do. Montgomery County has three dog exercise areas—Black Hill Regional Park, Ridge Road Recreational Park and Wheaton Regional

## “CHEVY CHASE AT HOME” NEIGHBORHOOD VILLAGE CONCEPT FOR AGING- IN PLACE IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Two very active and committed residents of the Town of Chevy Chase are in the initial planning phase of a project to establish a *Neighborhood Village network* within our Chevy Chase area.

The goal of this “Village concept” is to allow elderly residents to remain independent as they age in their own homes. The hope is to encourage all folks who want to “stay put” as they age within the homes and neighborhoods they love, and to participate in the formation of a network titled “Chevy Chase at Home” ([CC@H](mailto:CC@H)).

The “Senior Village” envisions a voluntary membership association in a defined geographical area, set up to provide access to a broad network of services which enable people to remain in their homes and neighborhoods as they grow older. A successful “village” needs a minimum of 150 active, annual dues-paying members and works best with 300 participants or more.

The organizers of this effort envision a “One Call” for service system that will include help with any number of needs from transportation to pet and plant care.

*The planning team wants to find residents who are interested in participating on the multi-section organizing committee as well as being members.* Their immediate needs include finding residents who are eager to discuss ideas, add expertise, and help create and move forward with an action plan and determining how many residents of Martin’s Additions and other Chevy Chase towns would be interested in becoming members of CC@H.

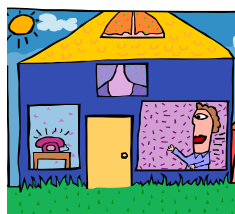

### VMA FOOD DRIVE HITS THE AFTERBURNERS !

The “National Day of Service” component of our ongoing **Village’s Food Collection drive** was held on Monday, Jan. 19<sup>th</sup>. It was organized to honor the memory of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. and to inspire a renewed sense of public service. On that one day **we netted an amazing 432 pounds of canned/boxed food, including items purchased with \$90 in cash contributions.** The bounty was delivered to Manna Food Project on January 22nd, by project co-chairs **Dick and Linda Kirschten**, who, with the help of their Turner Lane neighbors **Mimi and Peter Lara**, also manned the donation table outside the Brookville Market for six hours on the January 19th.

Thanks go to all of our friends in the Village and beyond who participated in this effort, with special recognition to Marilyn Hanlon of Section V! After stopping by the table, Marilyn headed home, rounded up some neighborhood kids and sent them door to door to collect. Their efforts produced four heavy boxes of food, dropped off at the Kirschtens in time for the delivery to Manna. Marilyn has since distributed our flyers to some of her neighbors, so word of our effort is spreading. On that note, on the evening of January 21st, Village Manager Jean Sperling and Linda Kirschten made a brief presentation to a committee of the Town of Chevy Chase, which is interested in starting a similar food collection project. Thank you to the committee’s Rose Miller for the invite.

With January 19th’s ‘haul,’ our total contribution to Manna for the month of January stands at 485 pounds — more than half of what we collected in five months last year! Tim Lanigan, Manna’s Director of Food Collection, said he will add our poundage to the County’s total take on the National Day of Service. In person, he pronounced our neighborhood’s effort “awesome.”

We still have more work to do. As in the rest of the country, the need for food in Montgomery County is great and growing. Collection boxes remain in place at the bottom of the stairs to the Village Office at 7013-B Brookville Road. You can also call the Kirschtens (301-986-5839) to pick up a box or bag from your door. Just think what we could achieve if each of the Village’s 320 families contributed just a single one-pound can of food each week. Keep up the good work.

## THAT WAS NO DOG!



You weren't imagining it when you saw that very large, very fast "dog" with a very bushy red tail flash by and thought.... maybe that's not a dog. You were correct—it really was a fox!

The Village has received numerous reports of a very fast fox(es?) spotted on Cummings Lane, Bradley Lane, Delfield Street, Raymond Street, in Section Three and Chevy Chase View. You may wonder what to do about it and here's what we found out from the state department of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Foxes are most active during the early morning hours although they do move about during the day especially when it is dark and overcast. They are solitary animals except from the winter breeding season (ah, ha!) through midsummer when mates and their young associate closely. Mating in red foxes normally occurs from mid-January to early February. Fox pups can be born from March to May. Fox have a wide variety of calls. They may bark, scream, and howl, yap, growl or make sounds similar to a hiccup. During the winter, a male will often give a yelling bark, "wo-wo-wo" that seems to be important in warning other male foxes not to intrude on its territory. Red foxes (which seem to be the type that have taken up residence in Martin's Additions) may dig their own dens or use abandoned burrows. The same dens may be used for several generations.

Fortunately we no longer keep and raise poultry here in Chevy Chase, because they are very vulnerable to damage from foxes. However, small pets can be killed by fox, at least according to information provided by Natural Resources Department. Birds can also be preyed upon by fox. Protection from fox depredation is most important during the spring denning period when adults are actively acquiring prey for their young. Watch for signs of fox depredation during the spring, especially if there is a history of fox in the area—they will often return to established denning areas year after year. Foxes frequently den in close proximity to human habitation.

Rabies outbreaks are most prevalent among red foxes in southeastern United States and

occasionally in the eastern United States. The incidence of rabies in foxes has declines substantially since the mid-1960's for unexplained reasons. In 1990, there were only 197 reported cases of fox rabies in the US, compared to 1,821 for raccoons and 1,579 for skunks.

Getting rid of foxes is not a simple matter. They readily adapt to noise-making devices such as propane exploders (not to mention what your neighbor will think of that!), timed tape recordings, amplifiers or radios, but such devices may temporarily reduce activity in the area. Flash lights such as a rotating beacon or strobe light (oh, no, the neighbors again!), may provide temporary protection in relatively small areas. Combinations of frightening devices used at regular intervals should provide better protection than the use of a single device because animals may have more difficulty in adapting to these disturbances

Trapping fox, while very effective is getting rid of them, requires a great deal of expertise (you'd need to hire a professional trappers), but perhaps most importantly to us here in Chevy Chase, this will inexorably result in the death of the fox. Fox cannot be trapped and relocated—the law requires that they be destroyed. So, we are probably better left to admire their beauty from afar, protect our little pets and use light and noise to scare them away so they don't get too close. Hope this helps you appreciate and understand that streak you see flying by!

## RECYCLING CORNER YOUR NEIGHBORS DON'T WANT TO RECYCLE YOUR RECYCLING!



On windy recycling days, weigh down all of your papers, cardboard and light plastic items. This extra effort saves chasing debris all over the neighborhood. Also remember that Styrofoam chips ARE NOT recyclable. Place them in the regular household trash and PLEASE batten them down.

## BREAK DOWN AND RECYCLE CARDBOARD PLEASE.

Cardboard boxes should be recycled on Wednesdays, not placed in the household trash.

## DON'T LEAVE RECYCLING BINS AT CURB

Please put the recycling bins out on Tuesday evening and return them to their storage place on Wednesdays.

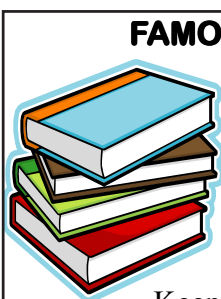
Wind can toss them quite a distance, possibly damaging property and at least breaking the bins.

**INCOME TAX TIME... DON'T FORGET WHERE YOU LIVE**

As a municipality in the State of Maryland, the major source of revenues for the Village of Martin's Additions is our share of income taxes which every resident pays to the state. In order for us to receive this revenue sharing, you must write **"Martin's Additions"** in the box marked "City, town or taxing area" on your Maryland Income Tax Form 502. This assures that a portion of your tax dollars comes back to the Village (as contained in State law), to provide you with services. This money helps support our municipal budget for trash collection, recycling, leaf collection, street cleaning, snow removal, tree care,



and the many other municipal services that are administered by the Village of Martin's Additions. Don't give those revenues away! You have much more control over how these tax dollars are spent right here in your Village and for your direct benefit.
